



Outcomes in Focus



Here are some picture-perfect outcomes this year!

- We hosted 7 free cooking & nutrition classes for 27 families. Kids and caregivers learned how to make healthy & affordable meals, including an easy-to-prepare kids' recipe. We distributed 167 lbs. of food during these classes.
- Community Meals in partnership with Rescue Mission. Over 175 meals served.
- Through the **Grow-a-Row** program, we have distributed or donated **419 lbs.** of fresh, homegrown produce donated to us through community partners and backyard growers.
- Open since June 17th, our GROW program has served 23 families, including 40 kids.
 Participating families have redeemed 79 coupons and received \$1025 worth of goods, including diapers, clothing, and bottles. Families earn at the GROW location or at 17 community partner locations in Grant County & Mill Township.
- The Cultivator Apprentice program provided 6 Mississinewa High School students with a paid summer internship. Students learned how to work on an urban farm, attended a summer academic camp, worked in community gardens, and learned how to outline their work experience on a resume.
- The Mill Township Resource Center, a partnership between The Grant County Rescue Mission
 and Thriving, brings in service providers to increase access to resources and combat the barrier
 of limited transportation. We currently host On My Way Pre-K registration, WorkOne
 employment workshops, a free, monthly health clinic from Bridges to Health, and community
 meals provided by GCRM.
- 75 community volunteers provided time and expertise to our working groups and programs.
- Collaborated with **44 community partners** and organizations for planning and programming in Mill Township and Grant County.





This year we partnered with Dr. Jennifer Noseworthy from Indiana Wesleyan University and the IWU Alliance Garden, for the Cultivator Apprentice program. This program, funded through IWU's Wildcat Incubator Grant, provided six Mississinewa high school students with a paid summer internship. Students worked the IWU Alliance Gardens, the Thriving Harvest Garden, and revived gardens at Northview Elementary and Mississinewa High School. Additionally, they worked at local farmers' markets to better understand the life cycle of an urban farm.

In June, the students attended the week-long IWU Urban Farming camp where they learned about pollinators, made jam, salsa, and pickles, and cooked a farm-to-table meal for their family and friends. Along with learning about careers in agriculture, they created resumes highlighting their job experience and skills. Five apprentices will continue to work for the program through October 2023.
